A SPOTLIGHT ON: The Prevent Duty

What is the Prevent Duty?

Prevent is one part of the government's counter-terrorism guidance. It can be found described in the Counter-Terrorism and Security Act 2015. The Prevent Duty is the duty of those in authorities to keep people and communities safe from the threat of terrorism. It focuses on preventing people from being drawn into terrorist organisations or ideals.

All school staff receive Prevent training. This teaches them what the Prevent Duty is along with how to apply it in schools. They are taught how to spot the signs that a child may be at risk of radicalisation, whether religious or political. Staff are also trained in clear guidance about what to do if they suspect a child is going through this to help keep them safe and supported.

In an attempt to combat radicalisation, [British values](#) are taught to children in UK schools. This is in response to the definition of terrorism as stated within [the Prevent Duty Strategy](#). Terrorism is defined as: “*Vocal or active opposition to fundamental British Values, including democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs.*”

This statement clarifies the four British values as:

- Democracy
- The rule of law
- Individual liberty
- Mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs



What is expected under Prevent Duty?

In 2015, as part of the Counter-Terrorism and Security Act, Prevent Duty was made the law. Under Section 26 of the act, it placed a duty of care on some public bodies. These included all schools and childcare providers. This section calls for providers to demonstrate that they are making sure children are not being drawn into terrorism. Teachers and childcare providers are subject to Prevent Duty and are expected to be:

- Assessing the risk of children being drawn into terrorism.
- Demonstrate that they are protecting children and young people from being drawn into terrorism by having robust safeguarding policies.
- Ensure that their safeguarding arrangements take into account the policies and procedures of the Local Safeguarding Children Board.
- Make sure that staff have training that gives them the knowledge and confidence to identify children at risk of being drawn into terrorism. They should also be given the tools to challenge extremist ideas, which can be used to legitimise terrorism.
- Ensuring children are safe from terrorist and extremist material when accessing the internet.

At what age does Prevent Duty apply?

Prevent Duty can apply from [Early Years Foundation Stage \(EYFS\)](#). This is under the evidence that children are at their most susceptible to cognitive development in these Early Years. Therefore, they are at risk of early imprinting of dangerous notions that may be harmful throughout their life. But, equally at this age, they are fully open to instilling in them the core British values that it is hoped will prevent later radicalisation.

What is Prevent Duty in the Early Years?

Prevent Duty in EYFS is woven in through the [Early Years Framework](#) aims of several areas of learning and development. Primarily, [Personal, Social & Educational Development \(PSED\)](#) and [Understanding the World \(UW\)](#). The hope of using Prevent duty in early years is to begin teaching children early about the virtues of moral or immoral and acceptable or unacceptable behaviour. This aims to provide them with a better viewpoint by which to view the world before they can begin to be unduly affected by outside impetus.

It is important to note that Prevent Duty in EYFS is not in place because the government is predicting a wave of radicalised Early Years children. Instead, Prevent duty in early years comes from examining the roots of such radicalisation and how to prevent it at an early age or stage instead of having to combat it later.

Prevent duty in early years focuses on helping children build their understanding and appreciation of others as early as possible. This means showing children about all kinds of different lifestyles and cultures, helping them see that there are lots of different ways of living that all deserve respect. The attitudes and ideas that children pick up on at this young age can influence them throughout their lives, and can be hard to shake as they grow up.

Along with talking about these ideas and values, a key part of the Prevent duty from early years throughout school is safeguarding and observing. Children who are vulnerable to radicalisation or going through something may show a variety of signs in school or at home which parents, practitioners, teachers and key adults may have the chance to spot. This leaves time and room for intervention, to offer children the support and care they need.

What are some signs to look for in children?

While they are not necessarily signs of radicalisation, there are many signs that are worth bearing in mind as indications of all kinds of potential issues. Some signs to look out for that might indicate a child is in need of help, include:

- Behavioural changes.
- Suddenly being part of an entirely new friendship group.
- Isolating themselves from friends and family.
- Speech appearing somewhat scripted.
- Being hesitant to or unable to discuss views and opinion.
- An increase in disrespect towards others.
- An increase in anger.
- An increase in secretiveness, particularly as concerns to online activity.
- Accessing online extremist material.
- Using of extreme or violent language.
- Creating written or artwork that has violent or extremist imagery.







SAFEGUARDING TOP TIP #17

Neglect

Neglect is the ongoing failure to meet a child's basic needs and is [the most common form of child abuse](#).

A child may be left hungry or dirty, without adequate clothing, shelter, supervision, medical or health care.

A child may be put in danger or not protected from physical or emotional harm. They may not get the love, care and attention they need from their parents.

A child who's neglected will often suffer from other [abuse](#) as well. Neglect is dangerous and can cause serious, long-term damage - even death.

Research shows that 1 in 10 children have experienced neglect across the UK. Neglect was identified as a factor in 82,950 assessments completed by social workers in 2021/22. 24,430 children across England were on a child protection plan because of neglect in 2021/22.






