EGGCELLENT CRAFTS

- Turn sponges into Easter egg stamps that younger children can use to create pretty spring art. Use the finished Easter egg paintings to make greeting cards for friends and family
- Let your children make some Easter egg button wall art that you can display year after year! You'll need buttons in a few different colors, a pencil to draw an egg shape (or use an Easter egg templates), and some glue to finish this project.
- Make an Easter egg wool garland by wrapping wool around a ballon and fixing with glue. Pop the ballon to leave the wool shell.
